The fellow will also work with Robert Griffin (http://ceve.rice.edu/Content.aspx?id=77), Professor of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Rice and Barry Lefer (http://eas.uh.edu/people/faculty/barry-lefer/), Associate Professor of Atmospheric Science, Atmospheric Chemistry at the University of Houston. There are no teaching responsibilities associated with the fellowship. The application deadline is May 15, 2013.
