

Exceptional Professional Opportunity for Graduate Students and Recent PhD's in the Humanities, Social Sciences and Math

Dear U.C. Berkeley Graduate Students and Doctoral Alumni,

We are contacting you about an exciting new diversity initiative that will offer graduate students and U.C. Berkeley doctoral alumni in designated arts and humanities, social science and math fields the opportunity to explore academic careers at some of the most prestigious liberal arts colleges and universities in the United States. The Creating Connections Consortium (C3) will create new opportunities for U.C. Berkeley's graduate students and recent PhDs, as well as new programs allowing undergraduates to conduct research at U.C. Berkeley. The goal is to establish a pipeline, broadening the participation of scholars with the potential to bring to their research the creative critical discourse that can emerge from a non-traditional educational background or an understanding of the experiences of groups underrepresented in higher education.

The first phase of the C3 initiative offers undergraduates from underrepresented groups at liberal arts colleges and universities the opportunity to conduct summer research at U.C. Berkeley. Presently, eight C3 undergraduates are participating in U.C. Berkeley's Summer Research Opportunity Program.

The second phase of the grant offers two-year postdoctoral fellowships at C3 liberal arts institutions for qualified U.C. Berkeley and Columbia University graduate students and doctoral alumni, providing access to teaching and scholarly opportunities at a consortium of liberal arts colleges and universities.¹ A total of twelve postdoctoral fellows (six from Columbia University

and six from U.C. Berkeley) will be selected for the first two years. A third R1 partner will be identified and added in year three at which time four postdoctoral fellows will be selected from each of the three R1 institutions. Each fellow will join a cohort at a specific college and receive mentorship, guidance, generous stipends, benefits and travel funds.² During the first year of the grant, Connecticut, Middlebury, and Williams Colleges will offer the postdoctoral fellowships, and the schools will also host scholarly presentations by graduate students at a spring conference. In the following two years, the full consortium of liberal arts colleges and universities will participate as potential hosts for both the postdoctoral positions and the graduate student presentations. In addition to the C3 postdoctoral fellowships, U.C. Berkeley graduate students and doctoral alumni are encouraged to apply broadly to other dissertation and postdoctoral fellowships and teaching positions offered within the C3 colleges and universities.

UC Berkeley has been asked to identify potentially interested and eligible graduate students and doctoral alumni for the postdoctoral fellowships in the fields designated by the Mellon Foundation (see the criteria below for the list). Please note that alumni currently employed in tenure-track faculty positions are not eligible for C3 postdoctoral fellowships. In the first year of the C3 postdoctoral fellowship certain fields are of particular interest. Please see the list in the footnote.³ Criteria for the postdoctoral fellowships are as follows:

- U.S. citizen or permanent resident in the U.S.
- Doctoral student or recent PhD in a Mellon designated field: anthropology, archeology, area/cultural/ethnic/gender studies, art history, classics, geography and population studies, environmental studies (if work is grounded in theory and/or a humanistic social science), English, film, cinema and media studies (with a

- theoretical focus only), foreign languages and literatures, history, linguistics, literature, math, theater (with a theoretical focus only), philosophy, political theory (but not political science generally), religion and theology, sociology, theater (with a theoretical focus only), interdisciplinary studies (these may be eligible if they have one or more Mellon fields at their core).
- On track to complete the doctoral degree in 2013-2014 or, for alumni, completion of the doctoral degree during the previous two academic years (2011-2012 or 2012-2013). Rare exceptions in specific fields may be extended beyond this time period to alumni who completed their doctoral degrees from 2008 to 2010.  - Demonstrated understanding of the barriers facing women and domestic minorities in higher education careers, as evidenced by life experiences and educational background; demonstrated potential to bring to research the creative critical discourse that comes from a non-traditional educational background, or an understanding of the experiences of groups underrepresented in higher education; or research interests in subjects that will contribute to diversity and equal opportunity in higher education (for example, artistic expression and cultural production that reflect voices not well represented in the arts and humanities or social sciences).

We invite you to add your name and information (doctoral status, doctoral department/program, dissertation title, general areas of expertise and contact information) to the attached form. In addition, please write a brief paragraph, no longer than one half page double-spaced, that addresses your teaching experience, field interests, dissertation topic and research interests. Please submit your information to your current departmental GSAO or your doctoral program GSAO at U.C. Berkeley no later than Friday, July 26. By providing your name and information, you are granting your permission to share this information with our C3 partners. To be fully considered for a C3 postdoctoral fellowship you must complete a C3

postdoctoral fellowship application. Early in the fall 2013 semester a link to the C3 online application will be available and announced broadly. The C3 postdoctoral fellowships will begin in the fall of 2014.

We look forward to hearing from interested potential postdocs as we begin this exciting new initiative.
