We invite applications to work on a project on **Fathers' Time with Children in the UK.** This is part of an EC funded project on *Changing Families and Sustainable Societies: Policy Contexts and Diversity over the Life Course and across Generations*. The aim of the four-year project is to investigate the diversity of family forms, relationships and life courses in European countries, to assess the compatibility of existing policies with family changes, and to contribute to evidence-based policy-making. This particular project feeds into an internationally comparative study of the trends and determinants of fathers' time with children in France, Italy, Sweden and the UK.

This is an excellent opportunity for an enthusiastic quantitative social researcher to work in an international team of researchers on a highly policy-relevant topic.

Working in close collaboration with Dr Ursula Henz, you will investigate fathers' time with children by analyzing the UK Time Use Survey and other large-scale British surveys. In addition, you will prepare research results for publication in international social science journals.

You will have a completed or nearly competed PhD in a social science discipline that demonstrates experience of advanced statistical analysis of large-scale surveys. Good communication and management skills are essential, as is experience of writing peer reviewed academic articles and research reports.
